## **From Editor**

Dear Readers,

Growing scientific production in the fields, which are in the area of interest of *Journal of Corporate Responsibility and Leadership* (JCR&L), create motivations for the colleagues cooperating with the journal to review the status of research in those fields. Thus, this issue collects the papers which employ systematic literature reviews or bibliometric methodologies to explore research output related to leadership, corporate social responsibility and organisational citizenship behaviours.

Andrzej Lis continues exploration of research on intersections between leadership and corporate social responsibility initiated by JCR&L. His study is aimed at identifying the conceptual structure of the research field through co-word analysis. He employs the methodology of keywords co-occurrence analysis and compares his finding with the results of previous studies based on literature reviews and research topic profiling. The study discovers four main thematic areas of research on intersections between leadership and CSR: "(1) sustainable strategy and sustainable development, (2) leadership and ethics, (3) humans in the organisational context, and (4) responsible leaders in sustainable and responsible organisations".

Monika Tomaszewska presents the findings from the comprehensive systematic literature review aimed identifying and exploring the antecedents of organisational citizenship behaviours. Her study is focused on the development of research and theory in the field and stratifies the scientific production published over four decades from the 1980s to the 2010s. She reveals the multidimensionality of the antecedents standing behind 'corporate patriotism', which originate from individual features of organisation members as well as the organisational and environmental contexts.

Umaru Mustapha Zubairu reviews 179 servant leadership research papers published in the 2010s. The systematic literature review employs Systematic Quantitative Assessment Technique to ensure scientific rigour of analysis. The analysis is proceeded by general research profiling presenting time and geographical distribution of scientific production in the field. The study is focused on identifying types of publications, data collection methods and leading themes in the analysed body of knowledge.

The review papers are supplemented with the report from the 4<sup>th</sup> International Scientific Conference on Positive Management and Leadership in Socially Responsible Organisations, conducted on 12 September 2019 in Toruń, Poland under the patronage of *Journal of Corporate Responsibility and Leadership*.

I hope that our Readers will find this issue of *Journal of Corporate Responsibility and Leadership* an interesting and valuable source of knowledge and expertise.
