On behalf of the new Editorial Board it is my honour to welcome the Readers of the "Comparative Law Review". Starting from this issue our journal will be published annually and it is our intention to commence the editorial process in January each year. The "CLR" will retain its profile as an open-access and peer-reviewed academic journal which includes submissions relating to both private and public law, with a particular focus on comparative studies. We also encourage authors to submit articles and shorter notes that are interdisciplinary in nature, though the legal perspective should be considered as dominant. Proposals elaborating on how the comparative method is applied in domestic and international jurisprudence are particularly welcome.

Kazimierz Lubiński, who was the Editor-in-Chief of the "CLR" from its reactivation in 2013 until 2016. I also would like to thank the Members of the Academic Board of the "CLR" for their continuing support. Last but not least, we appreciate the excellent co-operation with Mr. Christopher Wright in ensuring that the accepted submissions abide by the proper standards of academic English.
