Introduction to the Current Issue
of “Studies in the History of Philosophy”

The tradition of the studies on the history of modern philosophy, especially German and British, in the Institute of Philosophy, Nicolaus Copernicus University, was the reason for holding an international conference “Berkeley, Kant, and Modern Philosophical Debates” on 27–29 October 2016. The meeting under the auspices of Toruń magistrates, Polish Philosophical Association, and Polish Kant Society was organized by Adam Grzeliński, Nicolaus Copernicus University, Toruń and Roomet Jakapi from the Institute of Philosophy, Tartu University, Estonia. A year earlier, a similar conference had taken place in Tartu, initiating collaboration between the two philosophical circles. Also, Toruń Berkeley Workshop, one of the conference sessions, was the continuance of two similar meetings organized in previous years. In 2016, the contributions were devoted to the philosophy of Immanuel Kant, Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz, and the seventeenth and eighteenth-century British philosophy of Thomas Hobbes, Henry More, Ralph Cudworth, John Locke, Francis Hutcheson, Peter Brown, John Toland, George Berkeley, and Adam Smith. Even a brief glimpse at the programme convinces us of the richness of the early modern British philosophy which cannot be reduced to the famous empiricist Big Three of Locke, Berkeley, and Hume. The meeting attracted

an international group of scholars from Great Britain, France, Brazil, Estonia, Slovakia, Hungary, Finland, and Poland. Three days of discussions were not only an occasion to exchange ideas concerning less frequently studied philosophers but also enabled the participants to strengthen the bonds of international partnership. The articles by Sarah Hutton, David Leech, Ádám Smrcz, Dariusz Kucharski, Rafał Michalski, and Adam Grzeliński published in this issue of “Studies in the History of Philosophy” are either extended versions of the conference papers or refer to them topically. Several others (by Werner Euler, Ľubomír Belás, Sandra Zákutná, Roomet Jakapi, and Anna Markwart) have recently appeared in “Ruch Filozoficzny” (vol. LXXII, no. 4).
